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WELCOME

2021 continued on from 2020 as a very challenging year. We started it still in and out of lockdown and finished it still under restrictions leading to our carol service being changed to being Carols in the Car Park. Despite the continued challenges of 2021 we can still look and see God's faithfulness to us as a church. It was a joy to be able to gather when we could and the return of congregational sung worship was wonderful and I found very moving. It has been great to welcome more and more people back over the months as confidence to gather has returned and it has been a joy to welcome new people into the church family as God called them to be part of the fellowship here in 2021. It was and continues to be brilliant that others can still continue to join us online as we stream our morning service and I am grateful to our projection and sound teams for facilitating that. Over the summer our Picnic church allowed us to gather and reconnect with each other unmasked and the return of the summer holiday club was also fantastic.

2021 despite the challenges also saw us move forward in our mission to 'Be holy and Be a Blessing'. The establishment of SMB as the Christians against poverty (CAP) debt centre for Canterbury was really important and increasingly vital. Tony Washington as the debt centre manager has been brilliant. It is so great when you see exactly the right person called to exactly the right role at exactly the right time. The same can be said of Megan Johnson who started halfway through 2021 as our Youth Pastor. This vision to invest in our youth ministry has shown to be exactly the right thing. Megan is brilliant with the youth and has already laid some great foundations or the coming years. One of the highlights of 2021 was the launch of our Youth drop in café 'Café Lumen'. It has been brilliant to see around thirty young people a week come and find a safe space to chill out and enjoy each other's company.

As well as Tony and Megan coming on board the staff team in 2021 we have also had Marlee Worsley providing maternity cover for our finance role for which we are really grateful. There has been a change in our office as well with Catherine Colley moving on from the Church manager's role and at the end of 2021 Sarah Buchan stepping down from the church secretary's role. As a church we owe a huge amount to Catherine for keeping things going through the first part of lockdown and Sarah who joined us during a really challenging period gave a huge amount to us. Katie Mickleburgh took up the church manager's role and has been amazing. Again and again God has provided for us as a church just the right person at the right time and Katie is another example of this being a wonderful asset and a great blessing to us as a church.

I continue to praise God for my church family at SMB. It is a great privilege to be part of a wonderful and faithful team and I continue to be blown away by the faithfulness of the congregation in giving so much to the ministry that God has called us to here at SMB. I look forward to seeing what God has for us as a church in the next few years knowing that no matter what the challenges he has work for us to do and will provide all we need so that we might 'Be Holy and be a blessing'.

WOMEN'S MINISTRY

Women's Ministry was dormant during 2020 and 2021 as a result of the pandemic and lockdowns. However, at the end of 2019 we had started to consider whether the timing and format was serving the needs of SMB ladies as our numbers had dwindled. Before we began meeting again we wanted to know how ladies were feeling about the ministry and what they would like it to 'look like' going forward. September 2021 saw the launch of a survey that was sent to every lady in the church directory and resulted in 57 responses.

We launched a new look ministry with a supper on 10th December 2021 that was attended by 42 ladies. As a result of all the comments we continue to now meet monthly although it is now alternately on Saturdays 9:00 to 10:30 am for breakfast and Fridays 6:30 to 8:30 pm for supper. Each meeting includes a ten minute testimony to encourage and challenge us in our walk with Jesus. It's exciting hearing how God is moving in our lives and to be able to talk and pray together about things that concern us.

Sadly our February supper had to be cancelled at the last minute because of storms Eunice and Franklin which meant 30 ladies missed out on a scrumptious meal. The breakfast meetings in January and March were however well attended. It was exciting to welcome a number of ladies who had not been to a Women's Ministry event before and also to see some ladies bringing non-SMB friends. Going forward we have supper meetings planned for April, June, October and December with breakfasts the other months except August when we take a summer break. We look forward to welcoming many more ladies to these events where we seek to be holy and be a blessing.

FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

Fellowship Groups continue to be the primary place that we encourage church members to get involved so that can continue to grow as disciples through the reading the Bible, prayer and fellowship in community. It is also the primary place for providing pastoral support.

At the end of 2021 we had 18 active Fellowship Groups. Two new Fellowship Groups had begun through the course of the year, one of those groups meeting primarily on zoom and catering for those with young children. There are currently 186 people in groups.

As lockdown eased, some groups have returned to meeting in person, while others have remained on zoom, with occasional meetings in person, and other groups have developed a hybrid meeting pattern with a mix of in-person and online. Groups have done a variety of bible studies from Leviticus, Ezekiel to James and I Peter. Over the year some groups have also read books together such as 'Gently and Lowly' by Dane Ortlund and 'Garden City' by John Mark Comer.

The Fellowship Group Support Leaders (David and Pauline Whitehouse, Jan and Bob Newport, Stephen Carter and Charmaine Muir) continue to provide support to the Fellowship Group leaders.

We were finally able to re-open in September 2021 after the disruptions due to Covid. Not everyone was confident to join in again, and most of the toddlers of the spring of 2020 had by now grown up and moved on to playgroups or school, so numbers were significantly lower to begin with than they had been previously. So it was important to spread the word of our return, and reassure parents and carers that we had put appropriate precautions in place, with adjustments to the serving of snacks and sanitising routines, and of course ensuring compliance with all the official rules and guidelines. Having fewer families at our sessions has been beneficial, though, in making it easier to spend more time getting to know people, and really engaging with how they are getting on. Several months down the line, we are now welcoming about 30 families, many of whom have never been before, emerging from the lockdowns and subsequent prevalence of myriad infections. Our top priority is to offer an unconditional welcome to all, and we see mums, dads, grandparents and childminders as well as a diversity of language and background, everyone appreciative of the opportunity of giving their little ones an engaging play environment and themselves an end to isolation.

During the Covid break, the team spent some time re-thinking our vision for the group, and we had the opportunity to draw ideas and inspiration from training courses and research projects, the event organised by the Parenting for Faith team being especially helpful. Our advertised aim is now to 'nurture families physically, emotionally and spiritually', and we have been developing a 'spiritual growth and craft' table in order to foster that spiritual element in a way that is accessible. We have also run special events for Christmas and Easter, and these are always well received.

We have a committed team, who faithfully serve on each Monday morning in term time, and we are indebted to Sam and Rowan who go the extra mile to get the set-up under way too, but inevitably team members who have their own small children cannot always get there. We would love to hear from anyone who might be able to offer some help, even if that is no more than once or twice a term. We can all testify that it is a richly rewarding ministry!

CHILDREN

Just like everything in 2021, Children's Church had to change multiple times and both the teams and families were very good at adapting to new requirements. At the start of the year we were still meeting on zoom and although it wasn't ideal, groups continued and there were some imaginative games and storytelling happening to keep the children engaged online. It was wonderful to be able to meet together socially distanced in person in the summer term, and for many of the children it was the first time they had been back in the church building in over a year. We rearranged rooms to accommodate groups spreading out, and made weekly individual packs for the children to use. During lockdown we had spent some time recording action song videos to use over zoom, which have continued to prove useful when meeting in person, and the younger children love being able to choose songs to join in with each week. In September we were able to move back to our usual rooms and set up, and the team have continued to be brilliant at stepping in at late notice if someone has had to isolate. It has been wonderful to welcome new people to the team across the different age groups, especially as we have had more families with young children joining during and post lockdown - if you're interested in finding out more about joining the team, do get in touch! January 2021 we ran our first Parenting For Faith course which worked well on zoom in the middle of lockdown. We had around 60 parents, grandparents, godparents and children's and youth team taking part. We thought about how we can give children a window into our faith life, help them unwind wrong views of God, and use 'chat and catch' to talk to and hear from God.

After the success of the Christmas 2020 zoom Bake Along with Faith in Kids we joined in with their Easter Bake Along. We made chocolate brownies with mini eggs and heard how each colour of the mini eggs could represent a different part of the easter story. It was a lot of fun and definitely something to think about doing again in the future!

In the summer we were able to run Super Stars holiday club in person which Stephen Carter and I led along with a fantastic team of volunteers as we spent a week being superheroes at the Olympics! Although we had fewer children than previous years so we could spread out more, it was still as mad as usual with messy games, crafts, videos, challenges, and stories about heroes from the Bible.

Unfortunately due to high rates of covid in schools I haven't been able to have much time in our local primary school through the year. I managed to take in cake for the staff on occasion, and we were in regular email contact so could support families in emergencies when they arose.

. It is a joy and privilege to work with the children and families at SMB and to see God working in their lives. Do keep praying for them as many have had a very disrupted school experience the past few years. I'm looking forward to 2022 and building on all that we've been doing and seeing God use us to tell others about Him.

YOUTH

2021 has been a year full of new beginnings and exciting adventures. The summer term (July 2021) ended with our regular groups both Younger Youth (age 11-14) and Older youth (age 14-18) getting ready for change in September and all of older youth left for the adult world and a new cohort entered the groups.

I have had the massive privilege of getting to know both older and younger youth since September and we have some amazing inquisitive and respectful young people at SMB.

At the start of September both the volunteers and I came up with a plan for the next term of sessions for the young people and prayed faithfully each week that the young people would gain a deeper relationship with God. Younger youth started off the first term with the same sessions as the adults in the main sessions, and as a result of this we found that each of the young people had a lot of questions about what it means to be a christian and one of the stand out questions was "how do I know if I am a Christian?". So from that we have been looking at Youth Alpha and the young people have continued to amaze me with both their reflections and considerations of what they have learnt and also their ability to pay attention so early on a Sunday morning.

Then in Older youth we have been through Matthew and Romans and which although may sound simple, we had our fair share of deep questions and debates. All the older youth are excellent at wanting to understand the Bible and God better. Also, the fact it is over dinner time, and we have pizza most weeks is an added bonus.

Next year I am excited to see how the young people grow in their faith and try to deepen their understanding of God. With everything getting back into a familiar rhythm has also meant that the stresses of GCSEs are also back and looming closer so please pray for our young people that they may know God's plan for them and feel peace in their preparations.

Also a huge thank you for the amazing volunteer team, these groups could not run without you and you have been an asset to me and the young people over the last two terms. and Thank you to the young people who continuously show up to the groups and are ready to learn about Jesus. You are all amazing.









CAFE LUMEN

Our new addition to the SMB weekly schedule has been CAFE LUMEN. This started out as a vision to see the young people who have to walk past the church to get to the bus station finding a drop-in youth cafe that is a safe space for them to hang out after school.

It took a few weeks to get all of the layout just right and we had to buy so many different coloured chairs, but eventually with all our resources ready and an amazing team behind us we opened our doors.

Since September our numbers have only grown and so has the activities we provide.

We started off with all the usual fun youth club classics, pool table; table football; ping pong table. Then we added some crafts, one of which involves food which will cover a variety of young people. Then we have consoles, 3 types incuding some of the latest video games. Then it would be a cafe without our cafe section where you can chill and chat with your friends while also eating a toastie or drinking our famous milkshakes.

As time has gone on we attained the football cage, which is a large metal cage with 2 small goals that contain the football while allowing all the fun of a game. We have also added some tablets for homework as the homework room we originally made never got used as young people were worried about missing out on all the other fun. However, now our cafe area and sofas have become some homework spaces.

At Cafe Lumen we have a variety of SMB kids; other churched kids and also unchurched, and we would say there is a fairly even spread if not more unchurched young people attending our group, and although we have a regular bunch of 30 young people each week, we now have almost 60 young people who have signed up or signed in to our group at one time.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all the volunteers it honestly wouldn't happen without you and it is a joy to see how you have built relationships with these young people. We have also been blessed with each volunteer having unique sets of skills which meant we can offer different activities such as sports or embroidery. So if you have a skill please do contact me.

Overall, this group is a great core bunch of young people who see church as a safe space to be, and while we gave them "the real easter egg" and christmas gift all complete with tracts about real meaning of christmas and easter. We know that we are able to show them Jesus' love through the safe space we provide and it's very exciting to see.

So please pray we can reach those who we need to reach and bless those who already come to our group.

STUDENTS

SMB Students is an undergraduate community following Jesus together, to become like Jesus, to do the things that He did. In line with the SMB's vision, we want to Be Holy and Be a Blessing!

2021 began with another lockdown which meant the in-person but socially distanced student nights were put on hold and again replaced by online gatherings. Having studied Matthew chapters I – 4 in the Autumn term, from January to April the students met online to read, hear a short talk and discuss the Sermon on the Mount. These online evenings were kept to 60 – 75 minutes to avoid 'zoom fatigue' and developed a faithful following even though a few students who'd join in the Autumn dropped off, finding online too difficult to commit to and engage with. The Summer term continued with Matthew's Gospel (chapters 8 – II) but as we entered into May some of our meetings were able to be in person again. It was special to end a socially-distanced year with picnics, beach outings and a canoe trip too! The third years also managed to meet on Sunday evenings in May for pizza as we worked through the LICC Routed material, preparing them for life and faith beyond uni.

The Uganda trip scheduled for 2021 was postponed until Summer 2022 (for third years), with the hope for a full student trip to our partners at Jenga in Summer 2023.

As we moved into Autumn 2021 the student team were conscious that numbers were lower with previously committed students having graduated and left, and only one year group of students who had been present to remember 'normal times'. We made it our dual ambition to reach out to Christian students seeking a church at uni to make their spiritual home, and also to 'put out the nets' again, sharing the gospel and welcome newcomers in. With this in mind we collaborated with City Church to run a Thursday Evening Alpha, based at SMB, where we served food and had three small groups. We still have members of SMB Students with us who first came through Alpha. We feel offering students Alpha in the Autumn term is something we'd like to revisit next year too.

Once again this year couldn't have happened without some wonderful student champions. Nathan Marsh, Jacob Nicholson and Rose Ross have continued to give selflessly in serving our students. The team was ably boosted by our Discipleship Year Students Rowan Lovegrove and Sam Deal, never tiring in setting up events, welcoming students in, and donning an apron.







DISCIPLESHIP YEAR

The Discipleship Year is about growing as disciples of Jesus, learning how to serve him and his Kingdom with the whole of life, for the whole of life. It takes students on a life-changing journey of discovery and adventure, where there'll be inspired, get practical Kingdom experience, make life-long friendships, and have a lot of fun in the process!

Having rested our NWDY Hub for 2020-21 in no small part due to covid we were thrilled to recommence with five students for 2021-22: one based at Seasalter; one in St George's Deal; one in St John's Chatham; and Rowan Lovegrove and Sam Deal based here at SMB. Significantly for three of the students (including Rowan and Sam) we also began a partnership with the Church of England Ministry Experience Scheme. We now run the MES training centre for Canterbury Diocese, delivering content and training primarily through our tried and tested NWDY programme. Partnering with MES has meant we're able to advertise further afield for students and also benefit from a significant grant per student to enable participants to enjoy volunteering the year full-time, without the need for further employment. Sam and Rowan have been a blessing to SMB and the staff team this year with their hard work, humour, compassion and creativity.

With Revd Charmaine Muir also on staff for this year's cohort they've been treated to a weekly hour of morning Bible study, working their way through the whole Bible narrative, taking it in turns to prepare, deliver and receive feedback for their talks. It's been good to welcome back previous speakers for our Wednesday training days, but also new ones too. In Autumn 2021 we welcomed Revd Jon Marlow (DDO), Revd Andy Bawtree (River), Revd Laura Collingridge (Hatfield), Olly Knight (City Church), Revd Gareth Dickinson (Maidstone), Mollie Morrison (Fusion), Elliot Curryer (UCCF), Revd Rob Dillingham (Chichester Diocese) to supplement our otherwise internally delivered curriculum.

In October 2021 Stephen drove a minibus full of DY students, picking up the Tunbridge Wells Hub along the way to the first residential weekend at the Pioneer Centre at Cleobury Mortimer. Paul and Becky Harcourt (All Saints Woodford Wells) ministered to the participants on themes of identity, purpose and design, setting a tone hungry for God's shaping presence and power for the term ahead. As we prepare for 2022 we are currently producing some promotional material that we hope will help us recruit students and develop partnerships with other local churches. Pray that the Lord will send the right people to the right placements! Do also pray for Sam and Rowan as they look to their next steps beyond NWDY.





THE TAP

The Tap is for those in their 20s and 30s. While Fellowship Groups provide the regular bible study, prayer and fellowship, The Tap provides the opportunity for focused teaching for those in this age group, as well as opportunities for social events.

2021 began with events on zoom – starting with our annual prayer and praise evening to kick the year off. As the year progressed, we began to meet in person, some small group events in homes such as a games night and outdoors with a picnic and annual fish & chips at Tankerton. In the autumn we had a teaching event on 'Being a Christian in the Workplace' and a wine and cheese evening. Amongst the more organised events were some Sunday lunches and evening drinks.

There is a lot of lively conversation and laughter as well as a chance to think about the relevance of our faith to the different themes. We conclude with tea and cake. We are also planning an outing for the summer.

I hope the group will continue to grow in number but also in faith and provide a way in to the church fellowship. It has been good to see new people joining us already. Occasionally we will precede the event with a Communion service which is open to all, whether coming to Meeting Point or not. Why not give us a try and make it known to friends and neighbours?

Eco Church

This year has been something of a regathering for the eco-group, with a lot going on under the surface – sending out roots to do more in the coming year.

In line with this patten of starting small, we've been encouraged by the shift away from paper in the church's communications, and a greater emphasis on recycling and reusing resources. Likewise, after many months of languishing in the chancel, the solar panels have returned to the roof!

Continuing with the theme of the building, we've also undertaken a heat loss survey to consider where we may need to place additional insulation, and to attempt to work out a heating strategy that keeps us warm without contributing overly to the warming of the entire planet. If you take a look in the nave, you will see that we have begun to install additional glazing as a direct result of this survey. Less noticeable to the eye will be the tightening of several windows throughout the building to reduce several substantial drafts, but it is these sorts of small fixes that have an outsized impact.

We've also begun to consider land usage – it's been a delight to see the Garden of Remembrance open up into a space that can be effectively used on Sundays. Building on that, we have plans to rewild the grass along Nunnery Fields, creating alongside the trees, a wooded meadow habitat. This will increase the biodiversity of the area, as well as providing an attractive and visually interesting frontage to the church for passers-by.

As a result of this activity, we are now very close to achieving the Bronze level of Arocha's Eco Church Award, and anticipate that by the time you read next year's report we will be speaking in similar terms about the Silver award. Of course, we do not do what we do in order to achieve these awards, but they are useful markers of the progress that is being made towards a church culture that models the Anglican Church's Fifth Mark of Mission: "to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and to sustain the life of the Earth".

We recognise, however, that we cannot – and should not – do this alone. With changing situations for several of our members, and the urgency of the call to care for God's creation at the forefront of our minds, we have spent much of this year recognising that only if the church as a whole takes hold of it's stake in our ministry will we produce change that lasts beyond ourselves. To this end, we want to end with an encouragement – if you are at all interested in the environment, concerned by the climate crisis, or feel a prompting from the Spirit to join with us, do reach out.


MENS PRAYER BREAKFAST

MISSION PARTNERS

MERCY MINISTRIES STOP THE TRAFFICK

STOP THE TRAFFIK KENT has been very active throughout 2021. During the various lockdowns certain sectors of the labour market shut down, and the organised crime groups behind the trafficking of human beings in the UK moved their victims into forced begging, sex work and delivery services to profit from the increase in online shopping and fast food deliveries. To counter this we partnered with Kent Police to carry out welfare checks amongst fast food delivery drivers in Medway and supported warranted searches of premises involved in sex work across Kent, resulting in 12 arrests and 4 female victims safeguarded.

We also partnered with Kent Police on visits to nail bars and car washes in Canterbury, Herne Bay and Whitstable to try and identify victims and get them to safety, along with a warranted raid on a car wash in Medway that was suspected of trafficking and of drugs and arms offences. We also supported a male victim of labour exploitation and a sex trafficked female to enter the National Referral Mechanism and access safe houses away from their traffickers.

Our usual awareness raising activities with the general public, on how to spot the signs of modern day slavery and where to report any suspicions to, were scaled back due to covid restrictions, but we did run a really fruitful street event in Whitefriars in Canterbury featuring our "I am not for sale" live shop mannequins! We were also invited to give talks to raise awareness with many different stakeholders including to the Crown Prosecution Service on Child Trafficking and the UN Canterbury branch on modern slavery. We also secured a feature on ITV Meridian News to raise awareness of trafficking from a survivor's perspective that we journey with. Our members advocated for victims and survivors by joining the UK anti-trafficking sector in lobbying our MPs re the unintended negative consequences of the new Nationality and Borders Bill on victims of modern slavery. We await the outcome of this from the government.

Throughout the year we continued to walk alongside and support survivors of modern slavery, particularly females that have been sex trafficked, helping them to navigate the Home Office's broken system of support for victims and to support them in moving forward with their lives post rescue. 3 of our members opened up their homes to survivors, with one member provided a home to a female survivor of trafficking for 9 months. It is wonderful to see the transforming power of love shown in practical ways on someone's life after having suffered so much trauma.

At Christmas we ran our Christmas Angel Appeal at SMB, and raised funds to provide Christmas gifts for 15 children of female survivors in Kent, along with gifts for 20 rough sleepers who are vulnerable to trafficking in Canterbury.

The abundant fruit this year is all down to the big hearts for social justice of our many active STOPTHETRAFFIK KENT members, from SMB and other local churches, and to God's continual miraculous provision in opening doors and in equipping us with the courage, strength and guidance to be His hands and feet in some very dark places. God bless

MERCY MINISTRIES CHRISTIANS AGAINST POVERTY

The Canterbury CAP Debt Centre relaunched on May 9th 2021 when Tony Washington completed his (stages I and 2) initial Compulsory Training with CAP. He is not a Debt Adviser, but an agent of CAP qualified only in initial contact and support. It has been a real privilege to work out of the SMB Office and be part of the team for some of the week. It is great to be so well resourced. Nevertheless, the work has felt very hard at times. It is slow and often painstaking, and there are no quick solutions. None of our clients so far are debt free.

To date the centre has been allocated 25 clients, which includes those who have

finished the process with us and have been passed on to a Head Office Team (or taken an independent route), those who have yet to have their first appointment, and those who are at various stages in between, on the 'three appointment process'.

Some experiences with clients have perhaps shed some light on our society and the issues people face:

- The vast majority of clients are women, most of whom are bringing up school-age children.
- Many appointments have been missed through poor communication,
 Covid-related reasons and anxiety. Many other appointments have only happened because of persistent and laborious re-scheduling, and re-organising both client and the befriender.
- Many are struggling in barely adequate or unsuitable housing, adding other pressures. Most clients are also dealing with other issues. Debt may be the origin or the consequence of those other issues.
- Of those clients who have completed the three-appointment process (25% of those allocated so far) only one has been deemed to have enough disposable income to be considered capable of paying off their debt. A situation that can only become more common.

Some highlights:

There was a wonderful and encouraging involvement of the Fellowship Groups in providing much appreciated Christmas Hampers in December. One client came to the 'Carols in the Car Park' as a result of her interaction with the FG leaders who had delivered her hamper that morning. Every client has accepted an appreciated prayer at the beginning and end of most appointments.

Two clients have loved meeting at SMB and soaked in the atmosphere – perhaps feeling God's presence.

This is collaborative work:

The Debt Centre could not function without our lovely befrienders. I was able to start straight away in May 2021 because there were experienced and faithful befrienders who served with Becca and Lynn up to the end of 2019. This ministry needs and appreciates you! We have added a few more from Smb this year, and there is the prospect of more to come. PLEASE BE IN TOUCH IF YOU ARE INTERESTED and WOULD LIKE TO KNOW MORE.

We need befrienders all the more because in May 2022 a new Debt Coach will be joining the Centre! Please pray for Karen Sexton as she joins the team, sponsored by City Church. And pray for me; I have been operating like an amateur one-man band, now I have to manage a centre with a colleague and with more capacity for seeing clients!

MERCY MINISTRIES MAKE LUNCH

We started running MakeLunch in February 2017 as a place for families to come in school holidays whose children would usually have free school meals in term time. Over the years we have built great relationships with these families and it has become a tight community which is lovely to see. We have a great relationship with the local primary school who we work closely with to build links with the families. Over lockdown we moved from one off sessions face to face in school holidays to delivering food parcels to around 23 families, totalling 120 parents and children a week. Overnight we turned the church into an organised system of labelled tables as FareShare delivered all sorts of food every Thursday – they collect and redistribute unwanted or close to use by date food from supermarkets and local retailers, and we never knew what we were getting until it arrived! There was a hive of socially distanced activity as a brilliant team of volunteers came weekly to sort, pack and deliver the food parcels. This began back in April of 2020 and continued through to June 2021 with over 10,000 meals worth of food delivered, as well as crafts, books and activities for the children to use included regularly.

It was a joy to be able to gather the MakeLunch families again in person outside in Kendall Hall garden for a circus performance and workshop by The Flying Seagull Project in June. They usually work in refugee camps around the world but with Covid stopping international travel they started working with vulnerable children in the UK. It was a fantastic time of laughter and silliness, and the children loved being able to have a go at circus skills – they surprised themselves with how much they were able to do! It was great to see the families having fun together after such a long and challenging year.

We reintroduced face to face sessions in the summer holidays which the families were extremely pleased about. We had a lovely time being able to talk and eat together again. This continued at October half term and Christmas where we also gave out hampers to all the families we had delivered to in lockdown. As one of SMB's Mercy Ministries, we wanted to use what God has given us to be able to bless our MakeLunch families through the pandemic, and the families have been so grateful. Do continue to pray for Makelunch firstly as we look to form and train a core team to work closely together to shape MakeLunch going forwards, and secondly as we strengthen relationships with current families as well as getting to know new families.
